Assessment 1: USC HREC Ethics Application

Goal:	You are expected to meet the requirements of the relevant University Ethics Committees and to receive approval for your proposed research before the research can proceed. You are also expected to obtain such other permissions as are required to conduct the research. It is your responsibility to prepare applications for permission to conduct the research as well as for ethical clearance. These applications must be approved by your supervisor before they are submitted. You must ensure that sufficient time remains after such permissions have been received to complete the dissertation in time for submission. Delays associated with these procedures are not sufficient justification for an extension of time to be granted for submission of the dissertation. Similarly, any documents, reports or other works promised to outside agencies as part of the agreements with those participating agencies must be cleared by your supervisor before being sent.

Assessment Task 2: Proposed Dissertation Introduction

Goal:	You are required to submit a written introduction to your dissertation to your course coordinator via Blackboard by Week 6. The introduction should be submitted following discussions with your supervisor. It should include an overview of the research topic and a clear rationale for the research questions to be addressed. The introduction should explicitly state the overall study objectives and the specific aims of the investigation.
Product:	Written Piece
Format:	The introduction should be 1000 words in length. To facilitate your receipt of guidance and informal formative assessment, you should work closely with your supervisor throughout this assessment
Criteria:	<p>The proposed dissertation introduction will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Demonstrate a critical understanding of contemporary research in the chosen topic area. • Construct a clear rationale for the research question/s to be addressed. • Concisely state the research questions. • Exactly state the overall objectives and specific aims of the investigation. • Demonstrate a sound knowledge of APA6 format, writing and referencing styles.

Assessment Task 3: Oral Presentation

Goal:	The oral presentation is a formative assessment which will provide you with an opportunity to receive additional considered feedback on your dissertation proposal. The oral presentation will demonstrate your ability to: articulate the theoretical framework, research questions and research methods selected; argue for, and defend, the proposed research. It will be presented within your research supervision group.

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Assessment Task 4: Dissertation research proposal

Goal:	You will produce a dissertation research proposal which will lead into your next research stage.
Product:	Literature review (or component)
Format:	The dissertation research proposal, including introduction, literature review, and method, should be submitted following discussions with your supervisor. The introduction should include an overview of the research topic and a clear rationale for the research questions to be addressed. The introduction should explicitly state the overall study objectives and the specific aims of the investigation. The literature review should provide a critical review of relevant literature, identify knowledge gaps, and address the relationship of the literature to the thesis aims. The method will describe the specifics of investigation design, participant recruitment, ethical approvals, procedures, and data analysis.
Criteria:	<p>Combined, the dissertation research proposal, including introduction, literature review, and method will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Demonstrate a critical understanding of contemporary research in the chosen topic area. • Construct a clear rationale for the research questions to be addressed. • Exactly state the overall study objectives and the specific aims of the investigation. • Clearly provide all necessary information to understand the method of enquiry adopted. • Demonstrate a sound knowledge of APA6 format, writing and referencing style. • The document should be approximately 4000 words in length.

10.2 Assessment: Additional requirements

Eligibility for Supplementary Assessment

Your eligibility for supplementary assessment in a course is dependent of the following conditions applying:

- b) The course is graded using the Standard Grading scale
- c) You have not failed an assessment task in the course due to academic misconduct

10.3 Assessment: Submission penalties

Late submission of assessment tasks will be penalised at the following maximum rate:

- 5% (of the assessment task's identified value) per day for the first two days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.
- 10% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the third day
- 20% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the fourth day and subsequent days up to and including seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.
- A result of zero is awarded for an assessment task submitted after seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.

Weekdays and weekends are included in the calculation of days late.
