1.1 Description

This is the second of two intensive Italian language and culture courses that can be undertaken either at Università 'Carlo Bo' in Urbino, at Università IULM in Milan, or at Università LIUC in Milan, Italy. As a student of Italian language and culture, you will gain formal instruction alongside intensive first-hand experience in the speech community and the culture of Italy. There are considerable cultural/intercultural and life experience benefits.

Assessment 1: Host institution course

Goal:	You will undertake a number of courses or a single course recommended by your host institution as appropriate to achieve the learning outcomes of this course.

Assessment Task 2: Reflective Journal

It will give you the opportunity to monitor and to give thought your first-hand experience and progress in the country other than the language learning.

Assessment Task 3: Code of Conduct

Goal:	This task enables you to become familiar with the code of conduct for your discipline and work within its guidelines during the in-country study experience.
Product:	Code of Conduct
Format:	Professional/Industry format (conduct expectations) During your in-country study you are required to complete minimum 10 hours per week of learning experience. To be eligible to pass, you are required to complete the internship satisfactorily according to the criteria below. See Blackboard for your discipline specific Code of Conduct.
