Assessment 1: Journal

Goal:	The goal of the task is to provide regular opportunities to apply and review your language knowledge and ability.
Product:	Journal
Format:	Academic format. The journal is an ongoing activity task throughout the semester. You will be provided with worksheets or activities to complete on a regular basis. Open format demonstrating the evidence of language-learning and research on topics of interest.

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Assessment Task 2: Short oral presentation

Goal:	The goal of the task is to develop your Japanese language skills.
Product:	Oral and Written Piece
Format:	Academic format. During the first half of the semester, you will produce a written piece of 400- 800ji on a topic of your choice. You will give a short in-class oral presentation based on this writing.

Assessment Task 3: Oral

Goal:	The goal of this task is to deepen and express your knowledge of Japanese culture and society through research and language.
Product:	Oral
Format:	Academic format. During the semester, you will carry out a research-based project on a topic of your choosing, which relates to Japan. You will present it using audio/visual aids in the workshop. You will also participate in listening comprehension activity. The oral presentation is 10 minutes.

Eligibility for Supplementary Assessment

Your eligibility for supplementary assessment in a course is dependent of the following conditions applying:

- c) You have not failed an assessment task in the course due to academic misconduct

10.3 Assessment: Submission penalties

Late submission of assessment tasks will be penalised at the following maximum rate:

- 5% (of the assessment task's identified value) per day for the first two days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.
- 10% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the third day
- 20% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the fourth day and subsequent days up to and including seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.
- A result of zero is awarded for an assessment task submitted after seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.

Weekdays and weekends are included in the calculation of days late.
