### 1. What is this course about?

#### 1.1 Description

This course examines the legal environment for the holding, development, use and dealings with real property in Australia. It includes an overview of titling, tenure systems and property rights in Australia, encumbrances, land and building leases and tenancies, agency, and a summary of key pieces of property legislation and regulations. The course also explores the impact of a range of other pieces of legislation on the holding and use of real property, including compulsory acquisition, town planning, contaminated land, heritage provisions, environmental protection and native title.

#### Assessment 1: Essay

<b>Goal:</b>	This essay will require you to research, evaluate and discuss a key institutional feature of Australia's land tenure and transfer system.
<b>Product:</b>	Essay
<b>Format:</b>	This is an individual assessment, essay format, 750 words maximum.
<b>Criteria:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Application of relevant knowledge</li> <li>• Critical thinking, analysis and reasoning</li> <li>• Structure and writing</li> <li>• Presentation and referencing</li> </ul>

#### Assessment Task 2: Communique

<b>Goal:</b>	To research, synthesise, analyse and communicate information about a legislative development in property law. You will develop your skills in researching, synthesising & communicating technical information to a non-specialist audience using an appropriate written format.
<b>Product:</b>	Written Piece
<b>Format:</b>	The word limit for the text is 1750 words (excluding the reference list and any diagrams or graphics). Students will complete the activity individually or in pairs (self-selected).
<b>Criteria:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Demonstrate effective communication to a non-specialist audience in a student-selected output format;</li> <li>• Select relevant content, language structure to promote the audience's understanding of the subject;</li> <li>• Synthesise in students' own words correct information from credible and authoritative sources including primary sources;</li> <li>• Present work free of errors in spelling, grammar, punctuation or sentence construction.</li> </ul>

### Assessment Task 3: Final examination

<b>Goal:</b>	In the final examination you will demonstrate your knowledge and understanding of property law gained in the course and apply your knowledge to generate answers to questions.
<b>Product:</b>	Examination
<b>Format:</b>	This two hour examination is an individual assessment. It will consist of an essay and/or short answer questions. It will be an open book exam. Further information will be provided on Blackboard.
<b>Criteria:</b>	Marks for this assessment task will be allocated for: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• identification and analysis of legal issues relevant to the question</li> <li>• Stating and applying the relevant principles of property law to resolve the issues</li> <li>• Clear written communication</li> </ul>
