#### 1.1 Description

This course introduces you to the domains of social work and human services and the various frameworks that practitioners use to understand and support individuals, groups and communities within their social contexts. The wide variety of practice roles, fields and contexts within social work and human services practice are examined, unified by an emphasis on respect for persons, human rights, social justice, professional integrity, and critical reflection. The course aims to provide an overview of the breadth of human services work within contemporary Australian society.

#### Assessment Task 1: Individual Reflection

<b>Goal:</b>	To reflect on your motivations and values for undertaking social work/ human services practice.
<b>Product:</b>	Written Piece
<b>Format:</b>	<p>This is an individual written assessment.</p> <p>In your reflection, you should draw on the text, course PowerPoints, and other relevant literature to explicitly reflect on:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• What led you / motivated you to learn about social work/ human services</li> <li>• What do you understand the purpose and focus of social work/ human services practice to be?</li> <li>• What ideas expressed in the indicated course readings most resonate with you and why?</li> </ul>

#### Assessment Task 2: Series of quizzes on key concepts and processes

<b>Goal:</b>	This task will enable you to understand how various core concepts / processes canvassed in the lectures and course key readings inform practice.
<b>Product:</b>	Quiz/zes
<b>Format:</b>	<p>This is an individual assessment. You will access and respond to the quizzes via Blackboard.</p> <p>Quizzes may contain multiple choice and/or short answer questions.</p>
<b>Criteria:</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• For multiple choice questions there will be a correct answer</li> </ul> <p>For short answer questions responses will be judged according to accuracy of the response, level of understanding evident, critical analysis evident, and level of support through use of relevant literature, including the text, referenced correctly.</p>

### Assessment Task 3: Case study analysis

<b>Goal:</b>	To reflect on and apply unit concepts and processes to a given scenario.
<b>Product:</b>	Case Study
<b>Format:</b>	<p>In this assessment your presentation must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• demonstrate an understanding and application of relevant and chosen concepts and processes using relevant resources</li> <li>• demonstrate the importance of being a critically reflective practitioner</li> <li>• be uploaded to Blackboard</li> </ul> <p>Your individual essay must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• demonstrate you can reflect on your groups presentation</li> <li>• demonstrate you can discuss what you foregrounded and why</li> </ul> <p>use relevant course concepts and relevant literature to justify your selections be uploaded onto Blackboard</p>
<b>Criteria:</b>	<p><b>Presentation</b></p> <p>This will be judged by the quality of the material presented on the day by your group as assessed by your tutor. Other students will contribute feedback via discussion following the presentation. This requires you to be present on the day (unless a formal exemption is obtained) and actively participate in the presentation as negotiated with your group.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• demonstrated ability to apply relevant concepts and theoretical aspects of human services work to a practice situation</li> <li>• presentation indicates originality, independence of thought, creativity, and the capacity to engage others in the learning process</li> <li>• arguments put forward in the presentation are effective, organised and logically ordered</li> <li>• evidence of comprehensive engagement with and understanding of the course materials and relevant literature identified through your own research</li> <li>• clear expression of your ideas</li> </ul> <p>Your individual submission must:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• demonstrate you can reflect on the content of your groups presentation, and how other presentations enhance your analysis</li> <li>• demonstrate you can discuss what you personally foregrounded and why</li> <li>• use relevant course concepts and relevant literature to justify your sections.</li> </ul>

### 10.2 Assessment: Additional requirements

#### Eligibility for Supplementary Assessment

### 10.3 Assessment: Submission penalties

#### *If standard graded course:*

Late submission of assessment tasks will be penalised at the following maximum rate:

- 5% (of the assessment task's identified value) per day for the first two days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.
- 10% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the third day
- 20% (of the assessment task's identified value) for the fourth day and subsequent days up to and including seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.
- A result of zero is awarded for an assessment task submitted after seven days from the date identified as the due date for the assessment task.
